Beloved Zion,

The total solar eclipse was incredible. A few weeks ago, I had the chance to be in the path of totality, in Winona, Missouri at the Twin Pines Conservation Education Center. I had traveled down to Shannon County the day before to be with UCC clergy from across the conference. There were around a dozen or so of us who made the trip. With

opportunities for prayer, reflection, and fellowship it was so wonderful to connect and reconnect with so many. Our time together was invaluable. I left Tuesday morning refreshed in my ministry and excited about the upcoming season in the life of our church. Only the eclipse eclipsed the collegiality of the trip.

When the moment of totality began was truly amazing. The birds stopped singing. Bats streaked across the sky. It appeared as if the sun was setting in every direction. Venus and Jupiter shone brightly against the radiant blackness of eternity. Like an eye in the sky, the perfectly imperfect corona shone brightly as it danced around the moon. It was spectacular.

And then when the sun peaked out from behind the moon and totality ended, I was just standing in a parking lot. I started to laugh. A gravel parking lot, next to the fish fry trailer the conservation department uses. No curtain, no encore, no time warp montage to the next day. Just a few dozen people picking up lawn chairs, comparing photos, and figuring out what to do next. And while I didn't expect there to be some inner transformation for me, when it passed and we went back about our business, I had to chuckle. For how much of life is this way? How many wonderful moments are capped by the mundane? Like sitting in traffic after a game. Ordering a chicken wrap from the hospital dining services after the birth of your child. Picking up your dorm after graduation. This is the part of life we rarely see in movies. The mundane minutia of life.

As a pastor, I have noticed more often than not, what people cherish most about the people they cherish most are these tender moments that would otherwise never make a highlight reel. So when life isn't a transcendently fantastic spectacle, just remember, there is holiness, goodness, and love in all the small moments of our lives. And when you find yourself standing in some random parking lot, just know, that very place you are standing may have changed someone's life forever.

From the Historical Team... Celebrating the 90th Birthday of Margy Schowe

It is time to honor a special lady at Zion who is turning 90. This lady has been an admired member of Zion for years. She is beautiful both on the inside and outside. She is so kind and pleasant to all. Here is a summary of her life's journey.

Margy was born on May 15, 1934 in Warrenton, Missouri to Virginia (Fort) and Vernon Sprick. She had one sister and two brothers who are all now deceased.

Margy was enrolled in cradle roll, baptized, received her certificate of confirmation and married in the same church by the same pastor Rev. G. A. Roedder at Frieden's Evangelical and Reformed Church in Warrenton, Missouri.

Margy attended grades 1 thru 4 at Warrenton Elementary School, grades 5 thru 8 at Sunnyside School (a one-room school) and graduated from Warrenton High School in 1952.

Margy married Herbert Schowe on June 7, 1953. They sang in the choir that day also. They moved to Union from Warrenton in 1954. They both joined Zion United Church of Christ in September of 1955. They were married for 67 years. They have two children: Kevin of Fenton, Missouri and Jane (Schowe) Gulledge of St. Charles, Missouri.

Margy worked in retail and department management during her work career. She worked for Carp's Department Store in Warrenton for 5 years, Carp's in Union for 1 to 2 years, Nelson's Department Store for 4 years and part-time at Bade's Shoe Store for about 10 years.

Margy was a lifelong member of the Evangelical and Reformed faith now the United Church of Christ and she has served Zion UCC in many capacities. She sang in the church choir in the old church with Emory Hampel as the director. She was a member of the King's Daughters and served as treasurer of the Women's Fellowship. She served with her husband Herb as co-presidents of the Couple's Club. Margy also helped with Bible School, served at church dinners, helped with the

Mother-Daughter banquets, was a church greeter, helped with the communion ware and also helped in the nursery. She was very proud to have volunteered so much at church.

These items stood out to Margy about Zion; the building of the new church and the members being so friendly, kind and helpful. When they first moved to town, Rev. Gaebe helped them find a place to live.

Margy, you have a lifetime of memories from almost 70 years at Zion. Thanks for all you have done and may you have a blessed 90th birthday. Happy Birthday Margy!

Notes from the Music Director

First, I want to thank Chancel Choir for their beautiful job on *Nobody Knows but My Lord* on the April 21st service. I especially want to acknowledge Andy Wanager, who sang the solo. What a beautiful job!

When I hear harmonies like these, I feel the vibrations and blends are a way the Holy Spirit moves within us, whether we are listening or singing. The singing, however, creates a special resonance deep within us. No wonder music has been a part of rituals and services for millennia.

Recently, a post from a Facebook page called *Great Hymns and Songs of Faith* was shared quite a bit. Its title: **What Happens When We Do Away with the Hymnals**? Although I believe the post was created to address the popularity of song lyrics being projected on screens (maybe a counter to the repetitive nature of contemporary Christian songs), I think it's a good reminder to all of us about what we might be taking for granted. The writer, Joshua Gilbert, made the following points:

- The songs in a hymnal are vetted.
- Hymnals are a tangible source that encourages memorization and deeper feeling.
- Hymnals allow for harmonization.
- Hymnals support liturgical structure and theological education.
- Most hymns in hymnals are accessible to singers of all ages and abilities.
- Hymnals provide a cultural and historical connection.
- Hymnals can be used for both personal and group worship.
- The composers of the songs in hymnals were often inspired by scripture.
- Hymnals enable spontaneity and adaptability
- Hymnals encourage music literacy.
- Hymnals can be familiar and comforting.
- Hymnals often contain songs of cultural and linguistic diversity.
- Hymnals provide a physical symbolism.



I've provided a QR code here in case you are interested in reading Mr. Gilbert's explanation for each of these points. When I read over them, I realized he made many excellent points. Maybe it's time to dig deeper in the hymnals in the future.....

Did You Know?

In the recent edition of Emmaus Homes "Messenger", they reported that they transitioned 41 clients from Community Living, a group of 12 community homes in the St. Charles area to the Emmaus Homes located there. This is as of February 27, 2024. From those 12 new homes approximately 100 new team members also came, to provide residential services in all 76 homes for 220 people. This move means more high quality services to all the adults with developmental disabilities. The support of Emmaus partners – staff, donors, local churches and organizations, cities and volunteer groups – has been and continues to be instrumental. Together Emmaus and Community Living will continue to make an ever greater impact on the lives of those who are being served.


