Beloved Zion,

Grace and peace to you from God our creator, Christ our Redeemer, and Spirit our Sustainer. You might have noticed little electronic price tags at stores like Schnuck's or Aldi. Soon these little price tags will be everywhere. Alongside autonomous stock robots, these little price tags are a new technological jump in a grocer's playbook. In an instant,

prices can change, updates can be made, online and in-store prices can synchronize, and links to additional information can provide and increase customer satisfaction through consistency and transparency.

Technology is often natural. Neither good nor bad. What tips the scale, is how the technology is applied. With these new electronic price tags, there is a concern over surge pricing. Since prices can change instantly, and with algorithms and artificial intelligence getting more advanced, peak times could drive up prices. Imagine ice cream and water instantly going up in price when the temperature outside rises above 90 degrees. Or it could raise all prices during certain times of the day, or days of the year. Would you notice if every item was 15 cents more expensive the day before Thanksgiving? Maybe, maybe not.

In the life of the church, new technologies invite innovation and change. And I do not simply mean electronic technologies. Technology in its most basic understanding, is an application of particular knowledge to achieve practical and reproducible goals. At church, while technologies do include things like recording our services and uploading them to a website, it also means things like food pantries, VBS, and Called to Care. These all are direct applications of particular knowledge that help us achieve a desired outcome. The faithful question we must ask when faced with new technologies is not whether or not we will adopt them. The faithful question is why and to what end? There are plenty of programs and concepts that will help churches. There are so many great ideas that have created wonderful missions and ministry in their community.

But we must be careful. We might be tempted by a great idea and decide that we should do it here. But why are we doing it? To look good? To gain more members? Because the neighbors do something similar? Because it might help our community? These all might be great motivators, but at the end of the day, is it what God is calling us to do in this time and place? Rev. Howard Thurman once said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what

makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." So, church, what makes you come alive? What makes us come alive?

Notes from the Music Director

Anyone who has known me for a while knows I love drum circles. To me, there is just a

feeling of release in playing hand drums and an inner peace.

Just how were drums used in the Bible?

According to the book **Musical Instruments of** the Bible by Jeremy Montagu, the first mention of anything similar to a drum is in Genesis 31:27, Laban is scolding Jacob for leaving with his daughters without telling him. Depending on the version, Laban says he could have celebrated with tambourine, timbrel, or tabret. These all mean "small drum", like a frame drum. According to the book, the tambourine wouldn't be like the tambourines with which we're familiar, but would be more like a snare drum, with a strand or two of gut running underneath the underside. In Exodus, Miriam uses a timbrel in celebration of crossing the Sea. King David might have possibly used a drum that was made from ram's skin, with other parts used for other instruments. Psalm 81:2 says "....bring hither the timbrel..." (or "..strike the drum" in the Common English Bible). Isaiah 5:12 translates to tambourines, drums, or timbrels (although they used it for a wild party!).

This QR code leads to a website that shows ancient terra cotta figurines that probably date back to 7th or 8th century BCE, representing female figures playing a hand drum.

Why do stars appear to twinkle? Try this experiment to find out!

What you need:

- Aluminum foil
- · Large glass bowl
- Water





What you do:

- Crumple the foil into a ball.
 Carefully unfold it and lay it flat on the ground.
- 2. Fill the bowl with water and place it on the foil.
- Turn off the lights and make the room as dark as possible. Shine the flashlight about 1 foot from the water's undisturbed surface. Light will reflect onto the foil.
- 4. Then tap your finger on the water's surface. As the water moves, what happens to the light on the foil?
- This flickering simulates scintillation, which happens when starlight enters Earth's atmosphere. As light passes through layers of gas and water, it refracts and appears to twinkle.
